## **Devotion**

### Today's Devotion is by Grace Spratt, College Vice Captain:

I recently read a book called *Waking the Spirit*, the incredible true story of guitarist Andrew Schulman. Having being diagnosed with terminal pancreatic cancer in 2009, Andrew went into surgery to remove the masses. It miraculously was benign, but immediately afterwards his vital signs went haywire and he went into a coma. Andrew was in ICU for three days and not expected to survive. In a final bid to get through to him, his wife played Bach's *St Matthew Passion*. Almost immediately his vital signs started stabilising, and that afternoon he was out of the coma. Following this experience he decided to dedicate his career to playing in ICU, reaching people physically and mentally in a way modern practices cannot.

One chapter of his book focuses on David. In 1 Samuel 16, an evil spirit torments King Saul and his servants suggest finding a musician. The young shepherd, David, is invited to play. "Whenever the evil spirit came upon Saul, David took the lyre and played it, and Saul would be relieved and feel better, and the evil spirit would depart from him." Music's power to lift someone from such a place of darkness is so aweinspiring. As is God's knowledge. 3000 years ago he was healing through music, when science is only beginning to understand it now.

A few years back I heard the phrase; "God speaks through the language you know best." I believe that this is why, on the road to Damascus Saul, didn't just meet someone who told him about God, God raised up a blinding light and spoke directly to him. I believe this is why today we often hear God through repeated coincidences, because it is hard to comprehend something unless it is repeated to us over and over. What we should understand is that God knows us, and knows what we need long before we do.

The best known tip for happiness is gratitude, and Thessalonians tells us to "give thanks in all circumstances." We all know the value of those around us, and in the very beginning God said, "It is not good for man to be alone. I will make a helper for him", so he created Eve. Music is universally recognised to evoke emotions and memories. One of my most potent memories is worship in Cambodia, where we sang alongside the children in two different languages. Psalm 98 says; "Shout for joy to the Lord, all the earth, burst into jubilant song with music!"

My advice when making decisions is to follow what brings you joy. Yes, cliche! But if we've each been created with a purpose, what better way to find it than following where we feel true joy and fulfilment? Andrew was guided to music therapy by his passion as a guitarist and experience when music saved his life.

On a personal note, I regret not continuing VCE music or VCD, instead doing a second Maths class, which I dropped a semester later. (Maths is great but I wish I'd followed my passion more!). Alternatively, Texts and Traditions was a spontaneous choice which sounded fascinating, and it proved to be! I loved it, and it ended up being my top subject mark.

If you have a faith, listen and talk to God about any decisions. And if not, turn where your heart leads you. God always communicates what we should do. He gave us music, connecting our spirit to Him. We all need to leave ourselves more open, knowing God is in control. He knows us, He loves us, and He knows what will be best.

### What Did You Do at School Today?

### Prep

On Thursday 27 July, the Prep students celebrated their first 100 days of school. They enjoyed a day of special activities, with highlights being wearing their 100 Days of Prep hats on stage during Chapel and singing *Happy 100 Days* with Mrs Gaiser. During the day, they shared some of the things they had learnt since the start of Prep, including how to read and write, use our manners, make new friends, and that God loves us.

The Preps have grown so much since the start of the school year and each week it is a joy to see the progress they are making. Here's to the next 100 days!

### Year 1

Wow, we are already halfway through Year 1! This term in ICU, we are exploring Places and Spaces. We will study natural, managed and constructed landscapes, how they change over time, and how they are cared for. In Maths, we are learning about position and direction. We watched the story of Rosie's Walk and created a map showing where she went: across the yard, around the pond, past the mill, over the haystack, through the fence and under the beehives. In English, we are studying traditional tales and identifying the features of these timeless stories. Through our Bible lessons, we are examining the life of David. This will help us to have a greater appreciation of participating in the Junior School production; it will be such an exciting and wonderful experience!

#### Year 2

We have had a fantastic start to Term 3! In Mathematics, we are exploring a real world application of place value by looking at money. Representing three-digit numbers in different ways is helping us to expand our knowledge. We are working on writing a text that reflects our personal interests. Some of us are writing narratives, others are writing reports and some are even writing recipes.

Our new ICU topic is *Nature's Awesome Resources*. We are scientists who are investigating natural resources, where they come from and how we can conserve them. This week we have created a model of the water cycle in a plastic bag. Being inquisitive, questioning scientists is great fun!

### Year 3

The last week of Term 2 saw Year 3 celebrating history with a special dress up day. After learning so much from the award winning picture story book, *My Place* by Nadia Wheatley, we decided to dress up as the characters from each decade represented in the book. Although a work of fiction, the author used historical events to show how Australian life has changed over time.

We loved playing old fashioned games like marbles, hula hoops, quoits, skipping and jacks. It was impressive to see the skill of our parent helpers and teachers, who didn't think those games were so old fashioned after all; they certainly haven't lost their touch!

### Year 4

Students participated in a *Hands-On Science* incursion where they learned about different types of forces. In this valuable time of learning, students also made a rocket. In IT, using the BUDD:E website, students investigated what it means to be safe online. They examined the requirements of passwords and user names and learned how to recognise spam. During English, students are learning to ask questions to improve their understanding of the texts they read. In Mathematics, students have learned the names and properties of common 2D shapes and are now investigating time.

### Year 5

Welcome back! It has been lovely to hear about the restful (busy), enjoyable (challenging), fun and adventurous (scary and horrifying), experiences that students were up to over their holiday. Students were given the task of writing a descriptive piece about a moment from their holiday. From theme parks and rides, to injuries and illness; feasts and festivals, games, movies and pyjama days - we have heard the extremes of all! Students have shared their writing and we have laughed, found ourselves stunned and triumphed together.

In Maths, we have been challenged to find equivalent fractions and simplify fractions. We used fraction walls, dice, diagrams and our knowledge of our times tables to assist. In ICU, we have begun to explore what solids, liquids and gases are as we discover the different states of matter that we encounter daily. We have explored vocabulary to describe the properties of different substances and materials we have been exposed to.

We lit the candle on our lamp post for the first time, as we began to read our novel for this term, *The Chronicles of Narnia: The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe*. Students have shown great enthusiasm to fill their reading journals with questions, character traits and extraordinary vocabulary. We have learnt about the life of author, C. S. Lewis, and his life experiences, that can give us clues to his purpose for writing the novel, and the series of books which follow.

### Year 6

In ICU, Year 6 has been learning about the Earth. We have been studying the structure of the earth's layers

and volcanoes. Through our research of tectonic plates, we are impressed by the enormous heat inside the earth and the power that it displays in the form of volcanoes and earthquakes. On the last day of Term 2, we really enjoyed visiting the National Gallery of Victoria and the Immigration Museum, where we unpacked the suitcases of immigrants from different periods in time, including the 1850s Goldrush, World War 2 and the Vietnam War. A story which impressed us was that of Simcha Baevski, a Russian refugee who sold linen and lace door-to-door and eventually opened a store. We know him as Sidney Myer and his department store is Myer.

# Psychology

In the middle of the third week of school holidays, five students rose early, put on their school uniforms and met at 7.30am on a wintery morning to attend the Victorian Finals of the Australian Brain Bee Challenge 2017. David Fullarton (10.2), Liam Jarrott (10.4), Hamish MacDonald (10.2), Claudia Schulz (10.3) and Zachary Steer (10.2) were selected for the State Final; based on their scores from the first round of the challenge. This international competition is run annually for Year 10 students.

The day was hosted by various neuroscience organisations and institutions, and was held at the impressive Melbourne Brain Centre at the University of Melbourne. Our students participated in team and individual events, as well as listening to inspiring keynote speakers discuss their current research and career paths in neuroscience. We heard about how the drugs of the future will target neuropeptides to cater for more individualised treatment, and how researchers are currently using pluripotent stem cells which can be reprogrammed to potentially produce any other type of cell or tissue the body needs to repair itself.

A highlight of the day was the tour of the Harry Brookes Anatomy Museum, which is one of Australia's largest collections of real human tissue specimens and historical anatomical models. The museum is not open to the public so this was a unique tour for the Year 10s. We also visited The Cunningham Dax Art Collection which consists of artworks created by people who have experienced mental illness or psychological trauma.

Students were encouraged to consider pursuing a career in neuroscience with the myriad of research opportunities that will assist people in the future. Throughout the day, a line from Psalm 139 felt particularly apt: "I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made."


