From the Principal

Dear Friends,

Unfortunately, we are all too often confronted with news headlines about young violent individuals who run amok among others in order to kill as many people as they can. Their actions appear indiscriminate, extreme and often senseless. Otherwise, it may be of a jihadist or terrorist purpose with some barbaric overtones designed to disorient and engender widespread fear. Sometimes, perplexed by the empowerment of women and the absence of respected father figures, driftless young men have killed women and children despite the traditional male imperative to protect them. Historically, the only thing that stops such young men is older, stronger men, who compel emulation through example, love and perhaps coercion. Communities directly affected by such random violence express their disbelief, generally make calls for tougher penalties and move on with the burdens and joys of life, leaving grief stricken and shattered families to pick up as best they can. But it seems we are absorbing change less successfully than we used to. And for whatever reason, and there are many, an overwhelming problem is that the socialisation of young males across the world, is failing. Many feel alienated and without purpose.

At Oxley, we absolutely know our formation is a matter of community. A common life that involves relationships of quality and a shared enterprise where all know that they belong, is the basis of human formation. In community we need each other, accompany and complement each other. This has been a Christian imperative down through the ages. At its core, Christianity is about relationship.

In Christian community, colleagues are called to contribute to something or someone bigger than themselves. To do this, and by necessity, I, and I would think most Christian educators, have always been involved in restorative and strengthening relationships between individuals and in building a shared culture as a sure fire way to facilitate affection, respect and growth in people's lives.

In Augustine's words, "... it is one thing to see the land of peace from a wooded ridge ... and another to tread the road that leads to it".

As educators, an important role is to engage with people who are involved in schooling. We need to hear and understand their story. To be any good at this role, one has to be passionate, qualified, experienced and constantly learning. One has to love people and take the time to know them. And one has to be committed to this learning relationship, because it is a journey that takes more than a single conversation, with more than one person, over years and perhaps lifetimes, not just minutes and days.

Schools are about relationships and the quality of our relationships is a measure of our success. This is so for all schools, but in Christian schools we know that relationship extends beyond human to human, as we seek to introduce those we love to a God who loves us all.

So how do we measure success in Christian education? We look to Christ. He walked with those who were in the world. He formed relationships with every kind of person, recognising their great hunger for kindness, for mercy, for grace. He knew God's laws and yet chose to focus on relationships. Christian education is about transforming lives, one relationship at time.

Kindness, VHS Tapes and Video Stores

Colossians 3:12 Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience.

Remember the good old days of video stores? *Video Ezy*, when it was an actual store and not a machine dispensing DVD's in supermarkets. *Blockbuster* (R.I.P.) before *Netflix* domination or your locally owned independent? You would spend an eternity walking the aisles looking at covers, reading the synopsis and arguing with the family over which video to rent. When a decision was finally made, you would take the cover to the counter and receive your VHS tape to take home, to watch it over and over for a week!

Growing up, one of my friends worked in a video store. His definition of a kind person was simplistic. Those who rewound their video tape before returning it, they were kind. Those who didn't, he deemed inconsiderate. There was nothing worse than getting the tape home, popcorn at the ready to start watching, only to discover you had to rewind the tape first! "Be kind. Rewind" was a common sticker added to tapes or plastered as reminder posters near the counter.

I wonder what comes to mind when you consider kindness? Perhaps it is someone who lets you through a door first? Maybe offers their seat up on the train? Drops over a meal when there is sickness or loss in the family? Remembers your birthday? Or is kindness the person who is not easily angered?

We see kindness reflected in Matthew 10:42 And if anyone gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones who is My disciple, truly I tell you, that person will certainly not lose their reward.

We see kindness reflected in Philippians 2:3-4 Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather,

in humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others.

We see kindness reflected when we offer forgiveness to someone who has caused offense. It is happening when we are polite to a salesperson on the phone, even when they have interrupted dinner! Kindness may inconvenience us! But that is the thing about kindness, is it not? It costs.

Have you ever come across someone who only seems to be kind when it is to their advantage? Its insincerity can be grating. We find ourselves asking, "What do they want this time?" "True kindness", says Philip Keller, "is more than pretending to be concerned, it is getting down and dirty, being involved with personal sorrows and the strains of others, to the point where it may cost me something."

H. Norman Wright, writes 'kindness in marriage is one of the best places to discover if we are walking in the leading of the Spirit or not. The longer a marriage lasts, the easier it can be to take each other for granted. We can tend to ask, request, and demand more from our partner than we offer to help'.

1 Corinthians 13:4 Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud.


We love, because Christ first loved us. Jesus is Love. He loved us and loves us with a love that is pure, absent of envy or pride, ever patient and truly kind.

Senior School

National Science Week took place in Australia from 10 - 18 August and at Oxley it commenced with Science Assembly. Several students were interviewed about the Science subjects that they had chosen, particularly in VCE, and the reasons for their choices. Reasons varied including the relationship to tertiary study prerequisites, ATAR achievement and the desire to understand more of the world in which we live. Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Psychology are all offered in the VCE and are popular subjects following on from the Year 7-9 General Science and the four Year 10 Science electives: General Science, Foundation Biology, Chemistry and Physics.

I doubt that anyone will forget the recitation of the Periodic Table, as two students, Jeremy Tam (10.4) and Emily Sopar (9.19), managed to recall all the 118 known elements, including the 94 elements which occur naturally on Earth, with Jeremy narrowly taking the cup after some detailed adjudication. Kayla Robinson (9.22) quoted more than 50 elements and Sarah Hudson (12.9) courageously sang the first 40 or so to us. It left some teachers curious about the particular methods students had used to develop their recall to such an extraordinary level.

The Oxley version of *The Chaser* was hosted by the Science Captains, Callum Bish (11.14) and Zoe Sibley (11.13). Themed around general science, Thomas Steuart (8.23), Charlotte McGregor (10.2) and William Spratt (12.7) progressed through to the final to face off against The Chaser, the highly energetic Em Cee Squared (aka Mr Greg Barker). The Chaser's knowledge was put to the test and found wanting, proving insufficient to meet the level required to defeat the up and coming protégés, but he has vowed to better prepare for the challenge next year.

How to Write a Procedure

Procedures are texts that teach you how to do something. Today, you will read a procedure on how to write a procedure.

What you will need:

- Around 2-3 blank pieces of paper (or a book)
- A pencil
- Yourself
- An adult you trust (Mum and Dad)

Method:

- 1. Hold the pencil in your dominant writing hand.

- 3. Write a sensible title, that matches the topic you are going to write about, at the top of the page.

- 9. Ask them to follow the procedure to see if it is clear.
- 10.Add more detail, depending on the feedback from the adult who followed the procedure.
- 11. Revise your procedure by checking for capital letters, spelling, grammar, punctuation and to improve word choice.
- 12. Place another piece of paper in front of you.
- 13. Neatly write your improved copy.

You have now written an effective procedure. Well done!

Year 8 Excursion to Yarra Ranges Tech




