From the Principal

Dear Friends,

We warmly welcome you to the final school term for the year, and especially the students who have joined Oxley this term. Congratulations to College families on making it to this point on the calendar. We look forward to the celebration of student achievements after completing another wonderful year at the College, and especially the final weeks for our Year 12 cohort. Routine events will kick off in the coming weeks with the Year 9 into Year 10 Information Evening, the VCE Arts Exhibition, a number of Soiree evenings and Junior School Athletics. We look forward to welcoming parents and friends at these events.

At our first assembly of the Senior School we introduced and prayed for the student leaders selected for 2018. During last term, Senior School students were invited to vote for School Captains, Student Leaders and House Captains. Pastor Daly, along with Mr Whittle, Miss Hogan and Mr Kotzé were involved as part of the interview process over the last few weeks of last term. College Captains and Vice Captains are yet to be decided and those appointments will be made known at Presentation Evening, as is our normal tradition. I congratulate the students on their appointments and look forward to their contribution to College life over the next 12 months.

In the last few weeks of the College year, I take the opportunity to alert families to the need to maintain high standards of student presentation. I refer to how the College uniform is worn and our ongoing requirements for a neat presentation of students with appropriate haircuts, general appearance and behaviour. We will be discussing these matters with Senior students, along with other matters we are obliged by law to raise with 18

year olds. This latter focus is on the mandatory reporting obligations adults have for various types of abuse. If this is of concern to parents, please contact me at the College.

I shared with our Senior School leaders a Psalm of King David that reads something like this:

*Acclaim Yahweh, praise God all people of the earth
Worship Him, and come into His presence with gratitude and joy.*

*Be sure you know that the Lord is God
He made us, we belong to Him; we are His people.
Give thanks and praise as you enter His courts, and bless His Holy Name.*

For the Lord is good, His faithful love lasts forever, across all generations

It is constant from age to age. (Psalm 100).

This knowledge is for us all – not just for those in leadership. It really needs to be heart knowledge rather than just head knowledge. It is crucial information for leaders. Such knowledge is awesome and life-changing. In it we understand who we are – that we are the people God has made and therefore the people who should respond to Him. We are held in place by cords of love, so to speak, across all generations. God wants us to know that no matter what happens in our time, no matter what happened before we were born, no matter what happens after we die; His love, and our belonging, is across and over all generations.

Devotion

Martin Luther



October 31 will mark the 500th anniversary of when a young Monk, Martin Luther, nailed a document, his Ninety-five Theses, to the door of a church in the town of Wittenberg. The beginning of changes to the church and the world, he could never have foreseen.

Back then, the world was unsure about Martin Luther and his writings. There was great division. One Catholic thought Martin Luther was *a demon in the appearance of a man*. Another, who first questioned Luther's theology, later declared *he alone is right!* Today, the verdict is nearly unanimous, with both Catholics and Protestants affirming he was not only right about a great deal, but he changed the course of Western history for the better.

It began one fateful day, the 21 year old Luther was caught in a severe thunderstorm where a bolt of lightning struck the ground near him. In desperation he cried out for help and vowed to give away all his possessions and enter the monastic life, if only he be saved.

During his studies as a Monk, he struggled with a number of concepts, particularly with the concept of righteousness. Luther said, *"I hated that word, 'the righteousness of God,' by which I had been taught according to the custom and use of all teachers ... [that] God is righteous and punishes the unrighteous sinner."* He knew that by this teaching, he could not live by faith because he was not righteous.

As he studied further, he began to see a way through his dilemma. *"I began to understand that the righteousness of God is that through which the righteous live by a gift of God, namely by faith... Here I felt as if I were entirely born again and had entered paradise itself through the gates that had been flung open."*

Luther's religious, social, political and cultural influences are global. The Reformation encouraged the development of an image of humanity that was based on a new Christian concept of freedom. It influenced enlightenment and basic human rights, just like modern democracy. Luther's translation of the Bible into German caused the growth of a uniform written German language and opened a door to education to many who had had no access before. There is hardly any sphere of life that wasn't touched by the influence of Luther and the Reformation.

A few of my favourite quotes attributed to Luther include:

"This life therefore is not righteousness but growth in righteousness, not health but healing, not being but becoming, not rest but exercise. We are not yet what we shall be, but we are growing toward it, the process is not yet finished but it is going on, this is not the end but it is the road. All does not yet gleam in glory, but all is being purified."

"I have so much to do that I shall spend the first three hours in prayer."

"I have held many things in my hands, and I have lost them all; but whatever I have placed in God's hands that I still possess."

"So when the devil throws your sins in your face and declares that you deserve death and Hell, tell him this: 'I admit that I deserve death and Hell, what of it? For I know One who suffered and made satisfaction on my behalf. His name is Jesus Christ, Son of God, and where He is, there I shall be also!'"


Year 1

Workouts will be designed to improve the absolute fundamentals of the game - footwork and dexterity - all while addressing various national style of play concepts that are delivered out of the Centre of Excellence in Canberra.

The program will run from the start of Term 4 and continue over 26 weeks through to 31 August, 2018. Emma has come under the attention of coaches through her performance for her domestic club. She is playing for U/19 Melbourne Metro club who won their A Grade Grand Final on Saturday 16 September. Emma was awarded the Most Determined Player by the referees.

Art


Installation Art


