From the Principal

Dear Friends,

We warmly welcome everyone to the final school term for this year. Congratulations to students on making it to this point on the school calendar. We look forward to the celebration of student achievements after another wonderful year and to the final weeks with our Year 12 cohort. We wish students well in their preparation for final exams.

Routine events have kicked off the first weeks of Term 4 with the Year 9 into 10 Information Evening, the VCE Arts Festival, a number of Soiree evenings and Year 12 Valedictory Dinner. We look forward to welcoming parents and guests at these evening events. I especially draw attention to the Arts Festival to be held this Friday evening and invite our community and friends to attend from 4.30pm. The evening will be a celebration of VCE students' Art, Design, Drama and Music.

At our first Senior School assembly this week, we introduced and prayed for the student leaders selected for 2020. Recently, our staff and senior students voted for their Leaders and House Captains. I am often amazed at our human capacity to break free from the constraints of rationality when truth ceases to be the primary goal of inquiry. While people may be extremely passionate about some subject matter, a project or particular belief, we are simply engaging in self-deception unless we are willing to discover the truth of the matter. This is not a popular pursuit in much of our current public discourse. Self-deception is also a major part of what defeats our spiritual formation. When we refuse to acknowledge factors in our lives of which we may be vaguely conscious or even know to be the case, but are not prepared to deal with or even admit that we need to acknowledge, we have a problem. As a result, those faulty factors continue to govern our actions and shape our thoughts to the point of believing what may be patently untrue.

The biblical picture is that at some early point in our creation we were deeply betrayed by a spiritual enemy, and as a result we have been wounded by that betrayal. This wounding or failure through deception is not just a religious affair, but it pervades every area of human existence. The apostle Paul challenges us to walk in the light of truth, in the light of Christ, in order to see the reality of deception and the steps we can take to defeat its effect in our lives. In a similar fashion we challenge students to not simply and unthinkingly accept the secular prophesies of the age, but to do the hard work of seeking truth beyond the mere opinion of the majority and the number of 'likes' on social media. Indeed, the primary goal of Christian formation and a Christian education is the transparent evaluation of truth and hopefully, as scripture states, the ability to walk humbly with our God.

Chaplain's Corner

Dear Parent

Below is an abridged excerpt from a Huffington Post article I read recently. It's eye opening. A challenge and encouragement for all of us.

Dear Parent,

I know you're worried. Every day, your child comes home with a story about THAT kid. The one who is always hitting, shoving, pinching, scratching or calling out. The one who always has to hold my hand in the hallway. The one who has a special spot at the carpet, and sometimes sits on a chair rather than the floor. The one who poured his neighbour's milk onto the floor in a fit of anger, on purpose, while I was watching. And then, when I asked him to clean it up, emptied the entire paper towel dispenser, on purpose, while I was watching.

You're worried that THAT child is detracting from your child's learning experience. You're worried that he takes up too much of my time and energy, and that your child won't get his fair share. You're worried that he is really going to hurt someone someday.

Your child, this year, in this classroom, at this age, is not THAT child. Your child is not perfect, but he generally follows rules. He is able to share toys peaceably. He does not throw furniture. He raises his hand to speak. He works when it is time to work, and plays when it is time to play. He can be trusted to go straight to the bathroom and straight back again with no shenanigans.

You see, I worry all the time. About all of them. I worry about your child's pencil grip, and another child's letter sounds, and that little tiny one's shyness, and that other one's chronically empty lunch box. Most of my car rides and showers are consumed with the worrying.

But I know, you want to talk about THAT child. I want to talk about THAT child too, but there are so many things I can't tell you. I can't tell you that he was adopted from an orphanage at 18 months. I can't tell you that he is on an elimination diet for possible food allergies, and that he is therefore hungry all the time.

I can't tell you that his parents are in the middle of a horrendous divorce, and he has been staying with his grandma. That's OK, you say you understand I can't share personal or family information. You just want to know what I am doing about THAT child's behaviour. I would love to tell you. But I can't.

I can't tell you that he receives speech-language services, that an assessment showed a severe language delay, and that the therapist feels the aggression is linked to frustration about being unable to communicate. I can't tell you that I meet with his parents every week, and that both of them usually cry at those meetings.

I can't tell you that the child and I have a secret hand signal to tell me when he needs to sit by himself for a while. I can't tell you that I have been meticulously tracking his aggressive incidents for three months, and that he has dropped from five incidents a day, to five incidents a week.

The thing is, there are so many things I can't tell you about THAT child. I can't even tell you the good stuff. I can't tell you that his classroom job is to water the plants, and that he cried with heartbreak when one of the plants died over winter break. I can't tell you that when a classmate is crying, he rushes over with his favourite stuffy from the story corner.

The thing is, dear parent, that I can only talk to you about YOUR child. So, what I can tell you is this: If ever, at any point, YOUR child, or any of your children, becomes THAT child...

I will not share your personal family business with other parents in the classroom. I will communicate with you frequently, clearly, and kindly. I will make sure your child gets extra love and affection when they need it most. I will be a voice for your child in our school community. I will, no matter what happens, continue to look for, and to find, the good, amazing, special, and wonderful things about your child.

I will remind you and your child of those good, amazing, special, wonderful things, over and over again. And when another parent comes to me, with concerns about YOUR child... I will tell them all of this, all over again.


What Did You Do at School Today?




