Dear Friends,

At this time last year, who would have known what lay ahead and what disruptions lay in store for 2020? Who would have predicted the disruption to education, the economic cost of pandemic restrictions, the subsequent difficult relations with China, the stand-off in the American presidency and the devastation of the pandemic in lives lost in the Northern Hemisphere? Clearly, we become used to a certain lifestyle that develops a pattern for normality. Similarly, we have no idea of what next year will bring. And so, perhaps we are left wondering how best to be prepared for future major interruptions and inefficiencies, the computers that mutiny and those other storms that could be strewn throughout a year. Maybe a relevant strategy is to plan for unwelcome inconvenience, by which I mean being able to step back, catch our breath and remember to change what we can while not stressing about the things we cannot change.

The Biblical story is full of interruptions to people's plans. In His sovereignty, God seems to have authored both welcome and unwelcome, large and small-scale interruptions. Whether this was frustrating or not seems to have depended on people's ability to schedule enough of a margin in their lives to accommodate divine interventions. God's agenda for us each day, each year, is faith, not efficiency. Not all interruptions have a divine origin, but those that do are the ones to which we should give attention, even in hindsight. They are meant to sanctify us and nurture faith.

Perhaps the greatest of divine interruptions was the incarnation; the birth of the Christ-child. It was an event that upset many, especially the local Jewish authorities. Indeed, King Herod ordered all boys up to the age of two be killed in order to rid himself of any future threat to his power. Yet God's intervention could not be thwarted. How blessed we are to trust Him through interruption and to leave enough room for His agenda and demonstrations of love however they may be received.

Thank you to our College community for the many expressions of support and grace this year. We are very aware of the difficulties endured during remote learning. Even so, we have joy and gratitude for God's

blessing on our College year, especially as we were able to meet together in Terms 1 and 4 to celebrate some concluding graduations and assemblies with students. Congratulations to the graduating class of 2020 and thank you for your legacy of courage and resilience, and a warmth of supportive relationships across the year level. In a similar vein, we look forward with excitement to the hope of more normal years ahead and the completion of our magnificent new buildings and landscaping for the Junior and Middle school areas.

May God's peace be yours at the close of this year and in the beginning of the New.



I did not, and already it seems challenging to remember when we first heard about the idea of Remote Learning, or conducted staff training on the use of videoconferencing via *Teams*, or the plethora of online tools used to bolster learning experiences. Parents may well recall signing agreements to allow their child to safely participate in online learning, and then offering practical and emotional support through a time of incredible change. Students may well remember specific freedoms granted with the online platform, dressing casually while learning and possibly sleeping in due to no travel times, particularly for those with substantial commuting distances from Healesville, Yarra Glen or Heathmont.

Students and staff comment on how much they appreciate the joy of catching up with each other in person. We are wired to belong to a community, which became very apparent when it was removed. Being back at school enables friendships to be renewed on a daily basis, without planning to catch up, and to regularly pray and bless students in their presence, which feels different to doing this from afar.

I loved seeing the full return of staff, and the complete return of our students onsite. I greatly appreciate how wonderful life is when surrounded by young people being nurtured by an amazing band of Christian educators to find their identity in Christ and their place in the world. Staff have obviously enjoyed being back on deck. Their commitment to undertake a range of programs in addition to traditional subject-based activities, is testament to this.

Year 9 students experienced the Election Program to gain an understanding of electoral processes and the challenges of reconciling partisan politics with personal views. Year 7 Geography Fieldwork

Year 7 students have been learning that a healthy dam is an important resource to provide water for irrigation and gardens, a valuable habitat for local wildlife, and an attractive property feature. Students of 7.15 set out on an investigative mission during their Geography lesson on Friday 4 December, to measure the water quality of the dams located on the property of Life Ministry Centre.

During their fieldwork, students measured the level of pH, nitrite, nitrate, carbonate and water hardness. This then allowed them to determine the quality of the water and whether it was suitable for irrigation on the property, as well as providing a unique habitat for our local wildlife. Once analysed, they sent their data through to the property's Maintenance Team, who were pleased to receive the results in order to help maintain the dams on our beautiful property.
















Sophie's Fundraiser
